Important Notice:


All loads must be tarped and securely tied down to ensure the highway remains clean and safe for all drivers.

Garbage Pickup Update – Effective Monday, July 7th

Garbage pickup is now on **Mondays at 7:00 a.m.**, effective July 7th. Please have your garbage cans on the street by that time to ensure timely and efficient collection.

Helpful Reminders:

- **Place your garbage can on the street.** If it's not curbside, it may be missed. Public Works will return your can to the fence line after pickup to prevent it from blowing away.
 - **Do not hang garbage bags on trees or fence posts.** These will not be picked up.
 - **Double-bag fish waste.** In warmer months, especially if you are disposing of fish guts, please double-bag them. This helps prevent bags from breaking and stops maggots from ending up on the street.
 - **Secure your dogs.** If dogs are not properly secured, Public Works will not collect your garbage for safety reasons.
-  **Public Works appreciates all residents who continue to bring their cans to the street. Your help and support make a big difference!**

House Number Requirement

It is a requirement that all homes be clearly identified with their legal house number.

Effective immediately, if the Town is required to put or assign a house number to your property, a \$25.00 fee will be added to your utility bill. Please note that Bridger Valley, Union Wireless, and Public Works will no longer provide services to your properties that are not properly numbered. Thank you for your cooperation.

Magnesium Chloride on Town Roads – Information for Residents

Last month, the Town Office received a petition requesting the use of magnesium chloride on town roads to reduce dust. After researching the topic, we want to share some important information regarding its potential impacts and alternatives.

Magnesium Chloride:

Potential Risks to Pets:

While magnesium chloride is generally less irritating than other chloride-based salts, it is not without risks:

1. Ingestion: Pets may lick their paws after walking on treated surfaces, which can cause gastrointestinal upset (vomiting, diarrhea). Larger amounts may lead to dehydration or electrolyte imbalances.
2. Skin Irritation: Direct contact can cause mild irritation to paw pads, especially with prolonged exposure.
3. Pre-existing Conditions: Pets with kidney issues may be more susceptible to adverse effects.

Impact on Vehicles:

Magnesium chloride can also affect vehicles due to its corrosive nature:

- Undercarriage Damage: The chemical can splash onto the undercarriage and corrode metal components over time.
- Braking System: Brake lines may rust and weaken, increasing the risk of brake failure or inefficiency.

Signs of Vehicle Damage:

- Visible rust on the undercarriage, brake lines, or other metal components
- Fluid leaks caused by weakened seals or connections
- Unusual noises from brakes or undercarriage (grinding or squealing)
- Reduced vehicle performance (slower acceleration, difficulty shifting gears)

Cost of Paving Roads:

We also looked into paving town streets. According to UDOT, paving costs are approximately \$500,000 per mile, excluding relocating water and sewer lines. Newer subdivisions, like Eastridge and Dry Creek, are required to pave roads as part of development agreements. Continued on next page...

This new addition will help us water down the streets and keep dust under control, making our community a more dust-free and enjoyable place for everyone.

Utility Bills

Water and sewer rates increased effective July 1. If you are set up on auto pay, please double-check your account to make sure your payment amount has been updated. This will help prevent any past-due balances on your account.

Fall Water Service Notice

The Town Council has approved a program allowing residents to turn off their water in the fall and turn it back on in the spring at no charge. If you would like to participate, please contact the Town Office to schedule a work order. This ensures your water is properly shut off for the winter, helping prevent frozen or burst pipes.

Public Works staff will place locks on water meters and record the lock number on your account. If a lock is found cut or tampered with, a \$250 charge will be added to your bill.

Take advantage of this service to protect your home and avoid unnecessary repairs this winter!

Rural Water Association of Utah

RWAU has provided us with tips that we can forward onto our residents. The tips this month refer to a septic system but some of the tips can apply to our sewer system:

Follow these SepticSmart quick tips every day:

1. Think at the Sink!

Learn what not to put down your kitchen sink (such as fats, oils, or greases), how to properly dispose of food waste and how to use cleaning supplies in moderation.

2. Don't Strain Your Drain!

Learn about the importance of using water efficiently, staggering water use of water-based appliances and using energy efficient appliances.

3. Keep It Clean!

Learn about the importance of testing your well water, and its relationship to your septic system.

4. Shield Your Field!

Learn about your septic system's drainfield, including how it works, and tips to take care of it.

5. Protect It and Inspect It!

Learn about a typical septic system inspection, how often an inspection should be performed and considerations for advanced systems.

6. Don't Overload the Commode!

Learn about what can be flushed down the toilet, and what should be thrown in the trash.

7. Pump Your Tank!

Learn about a typical septic tank pump-out service, and how a septic tank works.
